Rules & Regulations

1. Any person may become a member for the current year by paying the Treasurer the sum of five dollars (\$5.00). Membership does not entitle one to admittance.
2. A fee of eight dollars (\$8.00) will be charged at the gate on Saturday – Sunday. Public school children are admitted free.
3. Prize money will be given out in classes 1, 2, 3, 15 & 16 on Saturday. Remaining classes will be paid following the fair. Entries to be in and tagged by 11:00 on Friday, August 25th, 2023.
4. All articles for exhibition building to the left on exhibit until Saturday at 4:15 p.m. **NO PRIZE MONEY WILL BE AWARDED IF REMOVED EARLIER**
5. All articles for exhibition building to the left on Friday, except livestock, must be on the grounds by 11:00 a.m. on Friday, August 25th, 2023. Judging will begin at 12:00 p.m. on the same day. Livestock must be on the grounds by 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 26th, 2023. **NO ENTRIES WILL BE RECEIVED AFTER THE ABOVE TIMES.**
6. All stock must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor at the time of entry and all grain, roots, vegetables, seed must be the property of the exhibitor and the production of his or her farm or holding and harvested **AFTER** August 1st of the previous year.
7. In the event of doubt as to any exhibitor having complied strictly with the provisions of Rule 6 or in the case of notice that any exhibitor has not strictly complied with the provisions of said Rule 6, two members of the executive shall be obliged to cause any exhibitors, with reference to whom such doubts exists, with reference to whom any such notice has been given, to make a statutory declaration of a compliance either the terms of said Rule 6. On failure to do so, all prize money will be withheld.
8. No person shall interfere with judges while in the discharge of their duties. Any person so interfering will forfeit any premiums that may be awarded and all the premiums will be forfeited should any person act as judge on property exhibited any him.
9. Sacks or packages having visible names or initials will not be admitted.
10. The judges shall, in the discharge of their duties, be careful to act with the utmost impartiality, and shall make their entries in a clear and legible manner, and their decisions shall be final.
11. All protest must be in writing and must state plainly the cause of complaint and shall be delivered to the President or Secretary before 6:00 p.m. on the day of the exhibition. The sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be deposited with the Secretary in each case of protest by the person making the same, to be forfeited if the protest is not sustained.
12. Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either the preparation, ownership, or representation concerning any article exhibited which may have affected or may have been intended to affect, the decision of the judges, the Board of Directors shall

have the power to withhold payment of any premium awarded, and may prohibit such parties from exhibiting for one or more years.

13. Entries must be made in the name of the producer or manufacturer only. Any person who shall enter an article for exhibitions as produced or manufactured by him or her, when it has not really been so, shall forfeit any premium that may be awarded to the article and be prevented from exhibiting in the future.
14. Any person entering the grounds otherwise than by the gate without the proper tickets shall be prosecuted.
15. While the Directors will take every precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of articles taken to exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting, and should any article be injured, lost or stolen, the directors will give all possible assistance towards recovery of same, but will not make payment for the value thereof.
16. If for any cause the receipts will not meet the liabilities, the prizes may be paid pro rata, at so much on the dollar.
17. No bull allowed on the grounds without two ties.
18. Registered cattle are prohibited from entering in grade classes.
19. The purebred stock pedigrees to be produced if required by the judges.
20. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded except where otherwise specified. Judges are instructed to award premiums according to the merit of the animal or article.
21. All animals must be exhibited in their respective class.
22. The right is reserved by the Board of Directors to reduce the amount of prize money on special awards paid to exhibitors below the amounts published in the various classes and sections of the prize list, as circumstances and conditions beyond their control may warrant and can be subject to change without prior notice.
23. All persons attending and being in or upon the grounds of the Shedden Agricultural Society during the days of exhibition are hereby notified and warned that the above Association will not be responsible for accidents or injury that may occur during the said day of exhibition on the said grounds and premises, to persons, animals or personal property. All persons attending the Fair and/or participating in, contestants do so at their individual risk.
24. Parties to whom special prizes are awarded will receive from the Secretary an order on the donor for the same, and must call for them within sixty (60) days of the date of the Fair.
25. In all cases where two or more parties take the same number of the first prizes, the Secretary shall decide to whom the prizes shall be awarded.
26. When prizes are given on points, 1st prize will count as three (3) points, 2nd prize two (2) points and 3rd place one (1) point.

27. Commercial exhibitors will be charged eight dollars (\$8.00) at gate and table rental is \$20/weekend. All commercial exhibitors and concessionaires must sign a “hold harmless” agreement with the Secretary, absolving the Shedden Agricultural Society of any liability, arising from any injuries or accidents that might occur during the Fair.
28. Only Fair Committee Members are allowed to remain in Exhibition Building while judging is going on.
29. Exhibits will be accepted Thursday, August 24th, 2023 6:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. and Friday, August 25th, 2023 8:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m.

NO EXHIBITS ACCEPTED AFTER 11:00 A.M.

Participant Rules

1. Child must fit in the vehicle properly. Sitting on the back of the seat is not allowed. Child must be of size and ability to control vehicle and not fall out.
2. Drivers must wear a protective helmet (hockey, bike, etc.) along with long sleeves, long pants.
3. Parental and Minor waivers must be signed. The show will be run immediately before the Demolition Derby.

Please come early to the pit area to sign in and be teched.

Car Rules – on website www.sheddenfair.com – Demolition Derby Rules

1. Any store bought, Power Wheels, Peg Perego, etc., type battery operated vehicle. Absolutely no homemade or modified cars allowed.
2. These vehicles can be cars, trucks, tractors, atvs as long as they are not modified. All atvs and tractors **MUST** have leg protectors, if legs/feet are exposed.
3. Only 6V or 12V batteries permitted; must be fastened down securely, no full-size car batteries – golf cart, lawn tractor or motorcycle batteries will be allowed, but must be fastened securely.
4. Doors, hoods, etc. can be wired or zip tied shut but not mandatory.
5. No locking up rear ends, strengthening bumpers or beefing up steering rods; vehicle must be stock.
6. Recommend some type of seat belt, especially for the little ones, to prevent them from climbing out while other participants are still operating.

2. Light horse refers to Arabians, Morgans, Saddle bred, and Thoroughbred
3. Entry fees will be three dollars (\$3.00) per class
4. Correct equipment and dress is a **MUST** for each class unless otherwise stated by a Judge. Juniors 18 and under **MUST** wear regulation riding helmet.
5. Please instruct the show director(s) of any tack change before the said classes.
6. Showmanship and Horsemanship patterns will be posted one (1) hour prior to class by the Judge of the day.
7. Show runs under the C.E.F. General Rules

Horses are to be 14 hands.

Open classes at this show shall be for light horse Stock type horses and Arabians.

Native costume will be run as no cross entry, however if there is a change in their costume then the same horse and rider may show in Open costume.

Classes are open to half-bred and purebred Arabians.
